# Hinkley Point C

n 3rd October, 46 of our A-level geographers and physicists undertook an eye-opening trip to Hinkley Point C, the UK's flagship nuclear power station under construction in Somerset, accompanied by Mr Bucknell, Mrs Batting, Mr Clayton and Mrs Holman. The visit offered a unique blend of academic insight and hands-on learning, giving pupils a deeper understanding of the critical role nuclear energy plays in the UK's future energy strategy.



We had the opportunity to meet one of the EDF physicists at the site who gave us a short brief on the construction phase and future capacity of the plant. For Physics pupils, it was a rare opportunity to see at scale how theoretical concepts are applied. Meanwhile, Geography pupils delved into the environmental implications of large-scale projects such as Hinkley and how nuclear power fits into the country's drive for sustainable energy.


# Wonderboy

#### Alan Beard

ell-known and highly respected construction industry leader Alan Beard died peacefully at home, aged 91. Alan worked for seven decades at the family firm Beard Construction, joining in January 1950, aged 17, when the South West company was led by his father, Geoffrey. He became Beard's managing director in 1971, then the thirdgeneration family member

at the helm of the business. He steered the company through many economic and political challenges, whilst at the same time helping grow company turnover to £200m.

Alan retired in 2021, aged 88. His impressive lifelong commitment to the company is a family trait; his grandfather and company founder, Edward William Beard, working to 103.

 $\mathcal{T}$  an touched the life of many Blundellians through his deep commitment to our pupils and their wider education through Outdoor Pursuits. He was the CCF contingent commander, coached and trained many for the gruelling Devizes to Westminster canoe marathon, and started a highly successful diving club. He embedded the culture of CCF and outdoor pursuits in many Blundellians over the years he was here, taking them on diving trips abroad, CCF camps to Germany and accompanying ski trips to Europe. While he would not have described himself as a teacher, he was an educator in the truest sense, leaving his values and influence on those fortunate enough to have meet him. He was dedicated to the pupils and gave so much of himself and his time to their development and welfare. He became a true friend to many.

His memorial service was attended by a wide range of OBs, parents of OBs, and colleagues, all drawn from different spheres of Blundell's life. This showed the breadth of his influence on the school. It was also telling that several were serving members of the armed forces. It seemed fitting that this was the case.

I can't think of another broadcaster who covered so many aspects of programming. He had a good voice for such that was authoritative but not overbearing and his diction was first class.
