Year 9 Trip to the Roman Baths, Bath.

Mrs Cox, Miss Griffiths and Mr Bunce took 33 Year 9 Classical Civilisation and Latin students on the annual department trip to the Roman Baths in Bath. The day started with an excellent workshop in the new Clore Learning Centre looking at the guestion of whether Aquae Sulis (Bath) was just an ordinary Roman town. The session involved the study of a range of literary sources and evidence including Roman artefacts providing insight into the various aspects of Roman Bath covering 'town life' and 'bathing'. It was brilliant to see the positive and interested participation of the students. The group then moved into the museum and Roman Baths taking themselves on a self-guided tour of the site making good use of the highly informative audio guides. The impressive Great Bath is always striking to see but students were also fascinated by the temple pediment, the bronze head of Minerva, and the underfloor heating system.



Physics Hinkley Point trip

In September, 29 pupils from Years 10-13 travelled to the Hinkley Point C site in Somerset to learn more about the construction of two new nuclear reactors there; the first in a new generation of nuclear power stations in Britain providing zero-carbon electricity for around six million homes.

The students were first received at Cannington Court, some 15 minutes from the site, where they listened to a presentation given by Dr James Mansfield explaining how nuclear fission reactors work and what design features make Hinkley Point C unique. They also had an opportunity to look around the exhibitions in the visitor centre before boarding a coach to look around the site itself. Although photographs couldn't be taken of the site itself, the students were bowled over by the sheer scale of the project, as well as the huge logistical exercise of housing, looking after and getting to site the 10,000 workers who enter and leave the site every day. Having seen the world's largest crane up close, many have been left with a taste for engineering in the future. It was great to see a project, which may well end up providing employment for some of our students for years to come.





ASTRO PI CHALLENGE

In the last academic year, Freya, Jasper and Pierre-Louis took up The Astro Pi Challenge which is a competition run by the European Space Agency (ESA) and the Raspberry Pi Foundation in Europe.

This challenge encourages young people to design an experiment that can be carried out on the International Space Station using an enhanced Raspberry Pi microcomputer called the Astro Pi.

In the first stage they came up with a detailed plan, accepted by the ESA and sent to the International Space Station to take photos of the clouds. The final challenge was a written final report, with the deadline just after exam week in the summer term. The ESA accepted their final report over the summer and the students have been provided with the certificate to prove their tremendous amount of work and outstanding achievement.

Cambridge Chemistry Challenge

part in the Lower Sixth Cambridge Chemistry
Challenge.

This competition, like the Olympiad, stretches and challenges students far beyond the A-Level syllabus and provides an excellent experience for anyone considering taking their studies further.

A big congratulations to Ed and Mengyan who achieved Gold. For context, this competition is only taken by the very best chemists in the country and only 20% of entrants receive Silver, 10% achieved a Gold and 0.6% achieved a Roentgenium award – Ed was 3 marks away!

'NEW BEGINNINGS' TALAN SKEELS-PIGGINS

The first lecture of our Enrichment Programme started with an inspiring talk from Talan Skeels-Piggins. Talan spoke passionately and candidly about overcoming adversity, focusing on the resilience we all have inside us. His own journey of recovery, acceptance and then determination, following an accident that left him paralysed from the chest down, hit the note perfectly. Pupils were blown away by what Talan has achieved from representing Great Britain at the Paralympics and breaking down barriers for disabled people by becoming the 1st disabled person to complete against able bodied racers in solo motorcycles to setting up a charity to teach disabled people how to ride motorbikes. Talan stayed behind at the end to speak to a huge queue of pupils personally, and their conversations ranged from topics such as skiing and racing, to adopting a positive mind-set and practicing mindfulness and gratitude.

BEN COLLINS

We welcomed back OB Ben Collins (FH 1988-1993) to share his extra ordinary achievements and pursuits in his career and speak with our Sixth Formers. As is widely reported, 'as the Stig, Ben Collins was the benchmark of speed against which all other drivers set themselves, the man that everyone from Formula One World Champion Nigel Mansell to Jenson Button tried and failed to beat. He has raced successfully in almost every class imaginable, from Formula 3 and Le Mans 24 Hour competition to American Stock Car Racing.' It was a thoroughly entertaining and inspirational talk for the students, with clips from Top Gear days with Tom Cruise and Cameron Diaz competing for top position on the leader board to the thrilling and technically challenging, high-speed chases from the James Bond films. In the words of one of our Sixth Formers, 'I feel fortunate that we were given the opportunity to have a talk from Ben Collins on his journey from 'The Stig' to Le Mans to James Bond and all in between. Some say we have met The Stig but also, we have met a fantastic example of an OB who is an inspiration to us all.'

BOB TAIT TALK

We've had the privilege of hosting Bob Tait from Drugs Education UK, who has engaged with students in Years 8 through 11. The aim? To provide them with age-appropriate insights on various aspects of drug-related issues:

STUDYING ABROAD

Pupils from Years 11-13, as well as parents, enjoyed a fantastic enrichment event where they learnt about the opportunities to study abroad. We welcomed Sarah Nash from Study Options who encouraged pupils to consider continuing their education in Australia and New Zealand. Emma Gettliffe travelled from IE University, a top international university in Spain with campuses in Madrid and Segovia, to highlight opportunities for UK pupils to study at institutions in Europe.

Pupils were left feeling inspired about their options and clear on the steps they will need to take should they choose to pursue these opportunities.

VAPING

Year 9 students attended an informative session on Vaping and its impact. They covered the science behind vaping as well as understanding the law and health and environmental consequences.



his included an introduction to the Commando Training Centre Royal Marines, Lympstone, Devon. The cadets completed a number of activities around CTCRM on the first day – this included unarmed combat, skill at arms, modern urban combat, a tour of the Bottom Field Assault Course, and a swimming test. With all of this completed, they then proceeded into the field. The cadets gained experience in fieldcraft and section attacks on Dartmoor. The cadets completed a round robin of activities in the rain, including close quarter battle, section attacks and a combined first aid and reaction to effective enemy fire activity. They visited 47 Commando to understand about the Royal Marines' amphibious capabilities, practicing beach landings ahead of a final exercise which combined the various skills that they'd learnt in a recce and an attack on Scraesdon Fort.

This attack was preceded by clearance patrols and recces around the Fort, identifying the enemy within and concluding in a dawn assault upon the Fort. On the fourth day, cadets proceeded again to Jupiter Point in Plymouth harbour to complete a landing familiarisation package with 47 Commando. After this, they conducted a recce on the Fort, after which they reacted effectively to fire from roving enemy patrols on their withdrawal. On the final day, the cadets visited 42 Commando at Bickleigh Barracks and completed a range package, which saw many cadets complete live firing for the first time. Cadet Sergeant Jasper from Blundell's School Royal Marines was first across the line followed by Marine Cadet Reuben also from Blundell's School crossing the line in second place, and excellent achievement for our cadets.

Blundell's Clay Pigeon Shooting Team had a great start to the season! In October, our A Team placed 2nd against some well established teams at the Rugby School Clay Pigeon Shooting Competition and our B team placing 4th. This was followed by an afternoon at Millfield in November where we finished 9th out of 20 schools and Note that the coming joint 5th overall in the ladies competition.



Armistice Day – the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month - remembered as an ending of hostilities - contrast that with the protest march in London over the Palestinian Israeli conflict in Gaza – an acknowledgement of new hostilities.

Subsequent wars and those happening now show that civilian casualties far outstrip those of the armed forces. The nature of war today seems to be ignoring all the rules of just combat. Forever we hear on the news that there are war crimes being committed and we may well ask: Where is our love? Where is our forgiveness? Where is our justice?

However, we must not diminish in any way the lives of those who have served their country in the cause of peace. Our act of remembrance was to reflect on all these things. As our preacher, the Rev'd Hannah Alderson, Lazenby Chaplain of the University of Exter reminded us Remembrance is about "re-membering": trying to come together again as a community in the face of conflict with a spirit of forgiveness and the hope of resolution and new beginnings.





OLD BLUNDELLIANS

Guy Dobson, OH (1965-69)

DIRECTOR, BLUE ANCHOR PRODUCTIONS LIMITED (NEW ZEALAND)

Guy has always had a great love for the sea. The youngest sibling of a family of five, growing up in the English Riviera town of Torquay, summer holidays were spent sailing dinghies and vachts in the beautiful Tor Bay.

During the 1950s and 1960s, the family business of shipping, motor vehicles (VW), coal distribution and haulage almost ran Torbay. As a youngster, Guy would walk through the firm's travel office looking at posters of Cunard, French, P&O, Shaw Saville, and Union Castle shipping lines. His grandmother's second marriage, after the tragic death of her first stock broker husband in WW1 in 1917, was to Frank Lund, heir to the Blue Anchor shipping line. This brought the two families together. A partner with his brother Albert in Blue Anchor Line, Frank went on to become a director of Anglo Persian (now known as BP) responsible for establishing their tanker fleet. Frank and Nora Lund (Dobson) had a private suite at the Grand Hotel in Eastbourne, Sussex. A bit of a character, insisting on his newspapers being ironed before reading. The Grand Hotel in the late

1930s, was a retreat for the deposed Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia. The Prince of Wales would occasionally pop down for a swim. Fast forward, just over eighteen months ago, Gavriel Bar-Or, now part of the Blue Anchor production team, contacted the family. After doing extensive research Gavriel advised we were the last remaining relatives of the William (Wilhelm) Lund dynasty. Gavriel (Wyoming, USA) a devoted Waratah fan, introduced us to Emlyn Brown (Western Cape, South Africa) another Waratah expert. Emlyn has undertaken over fourteen searches for the missing ship in Indian Ocean. He had also worked closely with renown Dr Clive Custler whose maritime adventure books grace the shelves of many an airport kiosk.

Project BAP Waratah Lund will tell the story of William (Wilhelm) Lund, founder and owner of Blue Anchor Line and illfated SS Waratah (Titanic of the South). From humble beginnings in Denmark, to a leading light of London shipping circles, only to be brought down to earth by an unprecedented act of Nature.



With a "living screenplay" the team now move on to the next challenge, raising significant capital (mainly overseas) to bring the enthralling story to the silver screen. The public will love it.

(NB: Born in Paignton, Devon; educated at Blundells School, Tiverton (OH 1965 - 1969) Married one of NZ Taranaki's finest and settled in New Zealand. Background in capital markets, industry, and creative content.



John Rees (NC 1973-77)

After leaving Blundell's I attained a degree in Architecture at Plymouth Polytechnic, followed by a post graduate diploma in Architecture at Oxford Brookes. Following graduation, I moved to London for 10 years and worked in a number of architectural practices, undertaking commercial work, from offices, shopping centres and residential apartments.

In 1992 I spent two years working in Tuscany. I then spent two years as a VSO in Malawi.

On my return I chose to retrain as a chiropractor and became a Doctor of Chiropractic in 2001.

In 2003 having worked in London, I moved to Ilkley to set up my practice. We have been one of the few chiropractic clinics to be commissioned to work within the NHS.

Amongst our patient base we have had pleasure in treating professional tennis players, golfers, footballers, cricketers, national hunt jockeys, and rugby players in both union and league, in addition to a wealth of patients local to Ilkley.

In 2023 I published my first novel based on an experience within the clinic - "The Chiropractor's Femme Fatale"
