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his end of term will be remembered for the snow and freezing weather. We tend to be pretty well covered in the acting and singing departments, but the dance elements were out of most of the pupils' comfort zones, but they rose to the occasion and gave us a performance to remember. It is hard not to be moved when watching pupils perform with such passion and talent. Amazing!





# The Blackmore – Chesney Society Dinner

Earlier this term we held The Blackmore - Chesney Society Annual Dinner to celebrate and discuss History, Politics and English. There was a fantastic turnout from the Sixth Form with 60 pupils turning out to listen to the speaker Mr Simon Batten deliver a fascinating and engaging talk on 'Myth and Reality and the First World War'. Simon Batten studied Modern History at Jesus College, Oxford. He teaches History at Bloxham School. He is the author of numerous books and articles and conducts battlefield tours. His first work, 'Futile Exercise?', examined the British Army's preparations for war before 1914. His most recent book, 'Remember him at the Altar', published in August 2022, focuses on remembrance of the Great War. He is currently working on a book on the French army under Louis XIV. # RePHRASE Talk

The theme in PSHE this half of term is "Relationships". Lessons have kicked off with Year 10 thinking about how we start and end relationships in a kind and healthy way, and with Year 11 looking at the characteristics of healthy relationships and reflecting on what their personal relationship values are. As part of the Relationship series, both year groups received a talk from PJ Livett, owner of the company rePHRASE (South West) who specialise in working with young people to help them understand their right to have healthy and safe relationships. The interactive talk was focused on "relationship red flags" and introduced terms such as "love bombing" and "gas-lighting" to help young people have the language to help identify and name certain behaviours. The session was full of really powerful messages and ended with some incredibly poignant reminders to pupils around not trying to repaint people once they have shown you their true colours, and that each of them are unique individuals who deserve to have happy and healthy relationships.

Music Scholars' Trip to London

26 of the Year 9 -13 Music Scholars travelled to London to broaden their cultural horizons on the Sunday and Monday of October 9th and 10th. Our first port of call was to attend Choral Evensong at Westminster Abbey on Sunday afternoon. The service included a variety of music, including that by the English Renaissance composers William Byrd and Thomas Tallis, composed some 500 years ago. There was time at the end of the service to soak in the history of the building. That evening the students watched a performance by the Chineke! orchestra. We were fortunate to watch a programme performed by the Chineke! Strings, who played some classics from the repertoire of British composers such as Vaughn Williams, Gustav Holst and Coleridge Taylor, as well as a dazzling piece by the outstanding young American composer Jessie Montgomery and a wonderful performance of Vaughn William's oboe concerto by the Chineke! Co-principal oboist, Armand Djikoloum. Students were fortunate to have the opportunity to meet the founder of the Orchestra, Chi-chi Nwanoku CBE at the end of the concert. The evening highlighted some exceptional talents and Chineke! were mesmerising and inspiring for our students in their ethos, diversity, and inclusivity.

The next day the group were lucky to have a tour of the magnificent St Paul's Cathedral. Students climbed 111 metres to the external stone and golden galleries of the dome and had a spectacular view of the London skyline. 

# Swimming success at Swim England



Rose, Gemma and Jodie all had a long weekend racing at the 2022 Swim England Winter Short

Course Championships in Sheffield from 2nd -4th December. Rose had her national debut, racing in the 50m breaststroke, showing great skills and turns during the race she finished in a fantastic 10th place in her age group (14yrs), a super achievement from a young swimmer at this high-level swim meet.

Gemma raced in 7 events and Jodie in 5 events over the three days, both girls setting several new best times along the way, and putting their racing experience and skills into good practice, developing race timelines and race plans for their different events. The highlight of the meet came on Saturday evening when both Jodie and Gemma had fast heat swims and returned to the pool to race in the junior finals' session.

Jodie raced the 50m breaststroke, close to her personal best time and in a strong field of swimmers placed a fantastic 5th place in the Junior final in a time of 32.25 seconds. Gemma raced the 400IM, and in an exciting race put her strong underwater swimming skills into practice setting a new best time and also placed 5th in the Junior final in a time of 4:54.43 minutes, both girls were delighted with their race performances in the evening finals. Rose, Jodie and Gemma are racing in the National Arena League Western division 1 finals on Saturday in Newport and are excited to be racing in this fun team event with swim friends. The next target meet for the girls and other Blundellian swimmers is to race at the 2023 Devon County Championships which will be held in January and February at Plymouth Life Centre.








# Ocean Racing European Championships 2022



The Ocean Racing European Championships 2022 run by the European Canoeing Association (ECA) were held in Cagliari, Sardinia 12 – 18 September 2022. The Championships officially started with a parade of all the National teams across the beach to an amphitheatre and a minute's silence in honour of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The British flag flew at half-mast next to all those of other nations throughout the week. The CB Ocean Racing Team is part of British Canoeing and connected to Surf Life Saving CB. The CB OR Team in Sardinia included competitors in the U18's, U23's, Seniors, Masters and Para classes. After a few days of acclimatisation and local training the Championship Race was held on the Saturday 17th, a 20km downwind race west to east across the Culf of Cagliari. The weather conditions were so challenging that the race organisers only allowed the juniors to race when authorised by their Team Managers. The race started with flat water, sun and little wind, but as anticipated the wind picked up creating big, steep, untidy waves, with white caps which made it technically demanding and hard work. The wind direction was almost perfect but it was blowing us out to sea so we needed aim more inland to keep to the race line. It was great fun but required concentration and quick reactions - overall I was very pleased with my race and enjoyed surfing the huge waves and was thrilled to come 6th in the U18 Women and to be the 3rd GB U18 women athlete.

The CB Team report that "Connie competed in her first international Ocean Racing event in the European Championships 2022 held in Sardinia, Italy. The conditions were at the top limit for the championships to be held, in excess of 25 knots. # **Girls Hockey**

The girls have enjoyed another very successful hockey season this term. It has been the first season since 2019 without any COVID disruption and 120 matches have been played by our 13 teams! All teams have enjoyed some great victories and have tested themselves against the best schools on the South West circuit.



There is a lot of talent

in School House and we therefore fielded five teams most weeks allowing every girl who wanted to an opportunity to play and improve. We have enjoyed some excellent results and the U13As are still in the National cup competition with the West of England finals in March. The U14s highlight of the season must be their 3-2 away win at Millfield on the weekend before their West of England Finals day.

The 15s have had a very strong season with strong wins against Taunton, KBS, King's Taunton and Sherborne to name a few. Many of these U15 girls have played up in the U16s National Cup competition and are still going strong. A narrow 0-1 loss to Millfiled meant the girls are now making their way in the U16 Tier 2 National Cup. Convincing wins against King's Taunton, Clayesmore & Cheltenham Ladies College have meant they have set up a Quarter Final with Marlborough College in the New Year. The senior teams have once again been a significant force on the circuit. The 4s, 3s and 2s have won the majority of their games with the 3s enjoying wins against Sherborne, KBS and Mount Kelly 2nds this half term. The 1st team have been outstanding again under the leadership of Miss Gill. They have won the majority of their games but perhaps the highlight of the season was stopping Millfield 1st XI's perfect season with a hard-fought 3-3 draw. The U18s had a hiccup on the road against a well-drilled Wells Cathedral side which prevented them progressing in the National Cup. However, word gets around and the girls were invited by Rugby School to play in prestigious annual guest match which provided the perfect finish to a great season.

# **Rugby Cup Success**

The 1st XV produced their best performance of the season in a tough encounter against Sir Thomas Rich's school in Gloucester, in the U18 National Cup. The bedrock of the side's success was their physicality, both when defending and in attack. We dominated a far larger pack and stifled Rich's efforts to breakout. Aggressive defence, with an intelligent kicking game, which created pressure in the correct parts of the field, combined with a determination and freedom to attack when opportunities presented themselves, meant that the squad came out as 31-14 victors.

The recent bad weather means that this is not the usual end of the rugby season report we might be use to. With the postponement of the U18 National Cup Quarter Final against Marlborough, the tournament will extend into next term. Hopefully more success to follow! The rugby provision at Blundell's does not just focus on the elite performance end of the game, however. It is great that we had more pupils representing the school in various formats of the game than we have had to date. In fact, in November we managed to have every single healthy and available boy of School House playing, either full contact, constrained contact or touch. Plenty of positives to take from the season and it sets us up well for the Sevens next term.



In turbulent times for the world it was fitting, as ever, to pause for a while and reflect on past and present conflict: those who have lost their lives for their country, especially the Old Blundellians we remember in the Roll of Honour, and the broader picture of warfare internationally. It was fitting, too, that in the Litany for Peace this year, both Russian and Ukrainian, voices were heard. The R't Rev'd Jackie Searle Bishop of Crediton told the story of the Tomb of the

Unknown Warrier in Westminster Abbey, buried among kings, and for whom even Her Late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II "diverted" on her last journey into the church of the nation's royal families. Bishop Jackie reminded us that Remembrance should divert us all, it should inconvenience us, it should make us stop, it should make us think.









# World Challenge Trip: Morocco

During the summer an intrepid band of seven Blundell's pupils set out to go to Madagascar... then it was changed to Ecuador. .. and finally at the end of term they got on a plane to Morocco after the situation in both the previous two destinations had deteriorated so much that it was unsuitable for a school trip! There had been an awful lot of build-up training and anticipation was high, despite the large queues and long journey to Gatwick from Blundell's. The first phase of the trip was a community project on the edge of the Sahara Desert, which was a little bit of a shock to the system for the pupils. The project was helping out at a local school in one of the poorest parts of Morocco, helping to renovate the grounds while the pupils were on their school holidays. The second phase was the trekking phase, and this was through the beautiful Atlas Mountains to the south of Marrakech. The slight change in temperature was a welcome change for the group after a long journey up into the mountains and to the first village where we met our guides in the gite. Everyone was keen for the first day of trekking and it started with a fantastic walk up a valley to a spectacular mountain pass, before descending to our campsite for the night in a riverbed. We stopped at numerous Berber villages along the way, during the holiday of Eid Al Kabir, so were witness to the traditional celebrations, which were both fascinating and a little terrifying with men dressed in goat skins chasing the young of each village! The third day was perhaps the most challenging, and by this stage some were beginning to suffer with blisters and

other challenges bought on by trekking in the mountains! The whole team pulled together and made it through to the end with a welcome stay in a gite and some very comfortable beds in comparison! A challenging yet highly rewarding section of the trip for our Blundellians. The third and final phase of the trip was the rest and recuperation phase which took us to Essaouira and Marrakech.

change from the heat and the dust of

the Atlas - it is a large and bustling town on the coast, where the group had their first experience of a Moroccan souk, which was a nice gentle introduction compared to Marrakech! The Atlantic Ocean was a welcome sight after the heat and dust of the desert, although it was surprisingly quite cold! The pupils were allowed a certain amount of freedom here to go and explore what is a very historic and busy port town, with some of the freshest and most delicious seafood you can get in Morocco. Hotel Ali, where we stayed was just steps away from the main market square which is oven-like in the heat of the day, but at night comes alive with snake charmers and market sellers. Marrakech is a bit of a sensory overload - there is so much hustle and bustle and things to see and do. Gone was the refreshing breeze from the Atlantic, replaced by occasional sandstorms blowing in off the Sahara, which certainly made al fresco dining on the last night interesting - gritty! We finished off the trip with the 20 Dirham challenge - the group had 20 dirhams each. and 20 minutes, to find the tackiest/worst souvenir available. Despite some strong entries of dubious looking dolls, and some downright odd ones in the form of hair taken from the floor of a Barbour shop, the winner was the Marrakech key ring, on which Marrakech was spelt incorrectly!

Overall, the trip was a huge success and all members of the group had a rewarding and challenging time. The fact that it was so last minute and unknown only heightened the challenge for the pupils and they showed great resilience and flexibility to absorb the changes without complaint and conduct a World Challenge Trip to remember. They certainly contributed in a meaningful way to a rural Moroccan school and engaged with travel in a sustainable and responsible way - a wonderful trip that I, and the rest of the group would highly recommend.





Her 10 km races eventually became half marathon races and then they became Marathons. Kate has since completed four London Marathons, one Brighton Marathon, and several Ultra Marathons; all for various charities including training for London Marathon 2023 in aid of Hospiscare, Exeter.


In May of this year, she was fortunate enough to be given a place in the 88km, 5000m elevation Ultra Marathon in the Alpes. She finished under the 24-hour cut off in 18 hours 26min. Kate hopes this event will have helped her mentally prepare for her next challenge happening in May half term when she is competing in the Bob Graham Round; a 66 mile, 27,000 ft challenge across 42 of the highest peaks in the Lake District.

Alongside running, Kate began to dabble in a few triathlons a couple of years ago.

Kate describes completing the Ironman in Muskoka Canada as 'something she never thought possible, you just never know what you can achieve, mentally or physically until you put yourself out there.'

Kate's husband, Bruce, introduced her to the Age-Group British Triathlon organisation which enables triathletes to have a go at representing Great Britain in Age-Group European and World Championships. Kate thought she'd give it a go, but sadly was disqualified in a GB European Standard Triathlon event in August due to a navigational error. With only 1 qualifying event left at the start of September, Kate tried again and came 3rd in her age group! This means she has gained a place on the GB Age Group World Championship team and will be going out to Spain in September 2023 to compete for Great Britain. Kate says; 'running and competing has always been about supporting my mental health and helping to fundraise for charities close to my heart and I hope to continue it long into the future.'

Kate runs (no pun intended) the Blundell's Association parent group and runners meet each Tuesday at 6.15pm in the Prep School's car park for a quick run, all welcome!


