Academic



British Physics Olympiad

Just before half term a number of 62 students from Years 9, 10 and four keen Year 8s participated in the online Junior Physics Challenge run by the British Physics Olympiad (BPhO). It consisted of two 30 minute papers testing their Physics knowledge in a variety of ways. The challenge which is aimed at Year 10 pupils includes questions using a process of

elimination, some are general knowledge and not classroom physics, and some are from the

school curriculum. In total there were 6,171 entries from approximately 122 schools and students were awarded certificates if they achieved Bronze or higher.

I am delighted to announce the results of our participants this year - 5 Golds, 13 Silvers and 35 Bronzes. Special mention to our Gold award winners performing in the top 14% - Freya, Angel, Pierre-Louis, Pierre and Chester from Year 10.

Well done to everyone who entered, amazing effort from all especially the Year 9s who have only just started their GCSE course and special mention to Edward and Francesco from Year 8 who both achieved a Silver.





EPQ Exhibition

This year's EPQ Exhibition took place on Fri 23rd April. In what is becoming an annual event, 23 students took part in the exhibition which saw a change in venue from Ondaatje Foyer to Big School. Over the course of the afternoon the EPQ candidates were able to present their research to approximately 150 Staff and students (unfortunately due to Covid restrictions we were unable to invite Parents this year).

The EPQ candidates were quizzed about their chosen topics. Projects this year included 'The evolution of military vehicle amour', 'A cot mattress topper made from alpaca yarns', and 'Why was the Roman army so successful?'. It was a successful event, enjoyed by both EPQ candidates and visitors.

Elevate Education

We were delighted, at long last, to be able to invite an external speaker to visit our pupils. Adam from Elevate Education delivered study skills and time management sessions to our Year 7 and 8 pupils. The skills of learning covered were presented in a really engaging way and the pupils were left with valuable skills to consider and, we hope, implement into their learning to improve their learning habits and academic attainment.



Hope Not

The pupils in Year 7 and 8 received lectures from the internationally acclaimed charity Hope Not Hate on the subject of harmful language. The pupils were challenged to consider their own and others use of language through various scenarios with some really thought-provoking workshopping. Led by Owen Jones, the education and outreach lead for the charity, the day really made us all think and question our own place in the pyramid of discrimination.

Murder Mystery

The Year 7 were invited to a Cocktail Party where they had to solve a Murder Mystery. The Year 12 actors rivetted the audience with their performance! Our young investigators were sent by the suspects into various missions, collecting or finding out information. They really took their role seriously and grilled the suspects relentlessly. Each team guessed a different murderer. To almost everyone's surprise, the big reveal was unexpected!

Team Building Competition

The team building competition practiced and developed a variety of team and personal skills, with each activity developing the students' powers of expression, communication, listening, supporting and reflecting skills. The year group were totally engaged in the excitement of the competition and the opportunity to be given a task, develop a plan and execute it successfully was very rewarding. They learnt a great deal about themselves and others, whilst having fun. Mr Dawe, the Head of Outdoor Pursuits, commented that it was a pleasure to work with such an enthusiastic and engaging group of students.





A huge well done to the following Year 9 and 10 pupils who braved the stage for the Junior Debating competition on 12th May in Ondaatje Theatre. Representing the houses, we had a healthy combination of seasoned speakers and a few who were testing the water for the first time.

As always, our enthusiast and eloquent speakers explored a variety of topics and astutely argued on the position they were allocated. It was a well-attended and hugely entertaining evening where our pupils debated the relevance of our monarchy; the efficacy of detentions and whether or not the long-standing tradition of The Russell race should be banned. You will be pleased to know that the latter has been given the seal of approval for another year.

It was a closely fought competition this year, with the overall winners being Old House, closely followed by Corton House and Francis House in joint second place. A special mention goes to Rafael who took on the challenging role of chairing a debate. The winning speakers were Freya, Toby and Jack in their respective roles. Chester, Scarlet and Angus received commendations for their speeches.

There is no doubt that there is an appetite for discussion and debate across these years and we look forward to taking our articulate speakers further as we hope to enter more local and national competitions next year.

ICAEW BASE National Final



For the first time in 18 months the Ondaatje Hall Theatre was able to re-open its doors to a select audience of staff, pupils and parents. Music

London Chamber Orchestra Centenary

In May, the London Chamber Orchestra celebrated their centenary with a birthday concert in St John Smith's Square, London. Our Year 9 Music Scholars were due to be at the concert playing with the orchestra, but sadly the pandemic halted those plans. Instead, Jemima & Maria helped to compose the music for part of the concert. Working with other pupils from schools in London and Shaftesbury and composer Cheryl Frances-Hoad they helped shape the melody for the piece which was then performed by the Orchestra and various choirs. Our Scholars also finished their work as mentors working with pupils with learning needs in schools in Berkshire and London, albeit all on Teams. They were wonderful ambassadors, sharing their music and helping disadvantaged children discover a passion for a musical instrument.

House Music

This year House Music was a condensed affair, with five houses competing in the small group pieces only. Sadly, the ongoing restrictions put an end to the House songs, but there were still over 40 students rehearsing throughout the Music Department in the morning and then coming together for a fantastic afternoon to battle out the Inter-House Music competition. A range of styles and music were played and with less than two hours to prepare the results were really impressive. Francis House gave a wonderfully edgy performance of the Arctic Monkeys, North Close were ambitious in their close harmony singing, Corton House were smiling away with their beautifully harmonised Abba, Old House have us a real eclectic mix of instruments in a very tricky and wellhandled arrangement of Elton John's Rocket Man, and Petergate got Big School swinging in a very entertaining rendition of Bob Marley. After a very difficult deliberation, Petergate were declared the overall winners.

Summer Music Concert

The Summer Music Concert took place in the Music Quad at the end of June. After many hours of rehearsals and incredible support from IT and theatre technicians to bring this event to fruition, the weather held and a lovely evening of ensemble and solo music was enjoyed by all the pupils as well as an invited audience, although, once again limited by Covid, we were only able to have a limited number of invited parents. The event was live streamed to those that were unable to join us, making it a memorable evening to celebrate Music at Blundell's at its very best. All our ensembles that have worked so hard over the year were able to perform and we had everything from the beautiful Schindler's List performed by Laura Smith and the String Orchestra in her final year, to the Big Band and socially distanced Orchestra and Chamber Choir, to musical theatre from the Girls' Close Harmony group and sea shanties from the Boys' Close Harmony Group, as well as solos and duets from some of our finest singers and songwriters. It was a taster of the concerts we have missed this year and we hope that next academic year we will be able to return to more excellence in live music making for audiences.

Year 9 Concert

May saw our Year 9s enjoying their first performing opportunity in over a year. 22 students performed a variety of solo pieces and ensembles with all the instrument categories being represented across the night. Although we were unable to invite parents and friends to the concert, the students thoroughly enjoyed playing to each other and relished their moment on Big School stage with the professional accompanists and it was clear to see that there will be some wonderful concerts featuring this talented year group in years to come at Blundell's.

Year 10 Concert

The Year 10s had their opportunity to perform outside in Blundell's Garden as part of the Garden Open Day and despite the threat of heavy clouds, the weather held and 30 guests were treated to a lovely concert in a fabulous setting. There were solo artists, duets and ensembles showcasing a range of music genres and styles from jazz to classical to pop and rock. The students really enjoyed being able to play to an audience, even a small one, and rose to the occasion to showcase their musical abilities and the hard work that they have all put in to keep their music progressing in these difficult times.



Multi Activity Days

The Multi Activity Days for Years 10-13 really gave Blundellians the opportunity to finish the year on a high. "The Apprentice", overseen by Mr Frappart in DT saw year groups designing, baking, packaging and selling edible treats around the school, competing to make the most profit (with plastic currency of course!) 



Hardship Bursary Fund





Christopher "Chris" J.S. Emby (SH 1974-79)

Chris Emby, a loyal friend, old-school romantic, Certified Public Accountant, and hedge fund auditor extraordinaire passed away at his home in San Francisco on 14 April **2021**. For the previous four and a half months, he had stoically fought an intense battle against a rare and aggressive neuroendocrine carcinoma. He had recently celebrated his 61st birthday "COVID-style", by wearing a double-layered face mask outside on his porch alongside his devoted wife and close friends.

Chris was born in **1960** in Vancouver, Canada and was the son of an English father. At the age of two, Christopher moved with his parents to San Francisco and up until his death he lived in his family home, 20 of these years with his wife Julia Emby (née Blagden). From the age of 9 to 19, he attended British boarding schools. He started at St. Michael's School and moved to Blundell's School after.

At Blundell's he was called, "CJ" and was known for his knack for maths as well as his natural and prized athletic abilities in swimming, cricket, 3rd XV rugby, fives, shot put, and the brutal Russell cross-country race. He also served in the School's Army Section of the Combined Cadet Force.

At age 17, he returned home for a semester to treat and conquer a serious health condition; he learned from all those challenging experiences that each moment of his life was a gift that should not be wasted.

Throughout his formative years - with one foot in the UK and the other in the US - Chris honed his unique sense of humour that would support him for the rest of his life. Upon his return to Blundell's, he was the mastermind of a spectacular prank now revealed: in 1979, the Headmaster, had forbidden practical jokes (something to do with cars on the cricket pitch). Undeterred, "CJ" and Roger Brady (SH 1975-79) took advantage one night of a recent delivery of turf meant for the school's cricket pitch. Brilliantly conspiring with creative precision and glee, the crew 'borrowed' the turf, and prepared a perfectly lined, Wimbledon regulation tennis court – complete with net and rackets – in front the school's chapel. The next morning, the Headmaster clapped at this clever, non-destructive design; the school masters were left mystified, and the schoolboys became instant legends. Emby graduated with "A" Levels from Blundell's in 1979 and immediately became a member of the esteemed, Old Blundellian alumni network and Director of 'Friends of Blundell's in America.' He never forgot a fellow OB and in 2019, he visited Roger Brady in Texas just before Roger passed from cancer. During that surprise visit, "CJ" wore his 3rd XV socks and raised everyone's spirits in his own inimitable fashion; he was a true friend to the end.

Chris' strong association with Blundell's was symbolised when he was cremated with his beloved Blundell's Full Colours Jacket with its red and white shield crest coat of arms and embroidered school motto: Pro Patria Populoque.

In 1983 Chris graduated magna cum laude and second in his class at University of San Francisco (USF) with a B.S. in Business Administration and a concentration in accounting. In his career, his clients declared him as being one of the best hedge fund auditors as well as one of the most trusted and reliable guys in the profession. May Christopher J.S. Emby rest in eternal peace as he so justly deserves. He was indeed a brave soul.

Chris passed away May 11 2021, but it was clear from his eulogy, he loved his sport and his old schools! While at Blundell's, Chris was awarded triple colours: 1st XV, 1st XI, & Athletics, won the Russell and was a School Monitor. Chris trained to be an auctioneer and land agent and opened his own offices in Barnstaple, Bideford and South Molton.

He was a governor of St. Petroc's school for 18 years and of West Buckland school for 10 years. For a while he was Chairman of the Old Petrocian Club and also Chairman of the Old Blundellian Club. of which he was later elected President.

Thank you, Chris, for your many years of generosity to the School, we will miss you dearly.

Towards the end of my
last year at Blundell's, I
was accepted into the
'Sporting Elite USA'
programme to study
and train aboard. At
the time, I was doing
rehab for my knee
following surgery after
tearing my meniscus.
Based on my progress
and a personal best high
jump of 1.70m, I was offered
a scholarship to run track
and field at Queens University

of Charlotte, North Carolina, where I am currently studying Exercise Sports Science, with a minor in French and Sports Management.

I moved to Charlotte in August 2018, where I became a student-athlete, focusing on track and my degree. I was signed as a High Jumper, and I trained with my team and coaches, 6 days a week, in addition to 3-4 hours of physical therapy with our athletic trainers per week. I sustained two injuries during my first semester at Queens and I am still currently dealing with an injury, one I deal with through pain management as the injury will likely continue so long as I am playing competitive sports.

During my second year at Queens, I began training for the Pentathlon (Indoors) and the Heptathlon (Outdoors). My season was progressing well, I was seeing a huge amount of improvement in my performance across all the events: Long Jump and High Jump are my strongest in the multi-events. I was on my way to qualifying for the NCAA National Championships in the High Jump before Covid-19 resulted in Queens shutting down for the summer, and all athletics being cancelled. I moved back home to Devon, and I trained throughout lockdown. I was able to return to NC, hoping to begin my 3rd year. Queens remained online until the end of 2020, so I was living in Charlotte and working, but training was still on my own since the NCAA continued to keep athletics shut.



In 2021, the Athletics season began. My back injury had improved with the time away from the competitive season. My team won our conference championship by over 100 points, and this was where I recorded my qualification mark in the High jump with a jump of 1.73m for the NCAA National Championships. The NCAA Championship will be the first major collegiate championship in Track and Field since Covid-19. This will be my first time at the National Championships, and I am so excited to have to opportunity to compete on a bigger stage with some of the best athletes in the country.

I now have one more year to complete my degree and finish up my collegiate athlete career, although Covid has enabled me to gain one extra season of competition, I have been offered to stay on for the 5th year, to complete either a master's degree or a double major, and continue competing for Queens in Track and Field, which is a decision I will make in the next few months.

Dick Davies (P 1944-47)

After National Service in the RAF, where they taught me to fly, I got a job with the then British European Airways as a very junior co-pilot. 11 years later, after flying various types, I was promoted to Captain on Viscounts. Subsequently I flew in command of Comets, BAC 111's and finally L1011 Tristars. The merger of BEA and BOAC in 1974 enabled me to fly both long and short haul routes on the Tristar.



In 1981, I took early retirement and moved with my wife -a Texan- into our holiday home on the edge of a beautiful lake in Texas. The intention was to enjoy a quiet life fishing, swimming and water skiing on the lake. However, the urge to get back in the air soon overtook me and I set about getting my American professional pilot qualifications. This didn't take very long and in due course I got a job flying famous entertainment celebrities around the US and Canada.

I was privileged to fly many famous stars - household names - mostly American but some Brits. The economic recession in 1988 brought this job to a close. At the time, professional pilot licenses were valid only to age 60 and I was 58. I probably should have quit flying then - it might have saved my marriage - but I didn't and in 1990 we were divorced.

Nothing much happened for a few years but then, after a lot of research and study, I designed the house I am now living in. Then, in 1996 I met a widow. We soon became 'an item' and lived together for the next 21 years, until she died of Alzheimers dementia in November 2017.

I have one daughter who lives in rural Somerset and another who lives in Texas. I have a granddaughter who is a veterinary surgeon in Wellington, Somerset and a grandson who lives and works in Singapore. Because of COVID, but also the distance, we haven't been together for well over a year. However, we skype regularly. I suppose that, at 91, I am lucky to still be enjoying fairly good health and on the whole am happy with the life I have had.

Chris Arundell (NC 1954-57)

I was born in the Philippine Islands in 1939 and in December 1941 my parents, younger brother and I were imprisoned by Japanese Forces that had invaded the country (an American possession, at the time). The lightly equipped American Forces surrendered after a brief battle with General MacArthur escaping to fight another day.

In the Spring of 1945, MacArthur and the American Forces returned ('I shall return') and with a surprise attack led by the 1st Cavalry, we (4,300 prisoner internees) were liberated but remained in the prison camp until the devastating Battle of Manila between the two armies concluded some three/four weeks later with great numbers of military and civilian casualties. We were very fortunate to survive and, finally make our way to England before returning to the Philippines to rebuild businesses, companies and the country.

In 1950, with little to no formal schooling, my parents decided that my younger brother and I (10 and 8, at the time) should return to England for our education, where we were enrolled in a boys prep school (boarders) just outside the town of Buckingham. At this time, my father was assigned to India (Calcutta) resulting in long distance letter-writing to our parents and 'baby' sister for the next seven years with a brief 'one' summer family holiday visit. My father's cousin, William R. D. Arundell (an OB) introduced Blundell's to my father/me and I, somehow, got accepted by the School and enrolled in North Close in the spring term of 1954. Unfortunately, I was not scholastically inclined, particularly when it came to 'exams!' School 'life' did provide me a 'grounding' that I was able to take with me as I embarked on a career in 'shipping, commercial maritime insurance and risk management' in England and the United States.

I emigrated to the U.S. in 1960 (assignment with an English based company) working for 20 years in San Francisco followed by 35 years

in Seattle (different company but related line of work).
Following retirement, my wife and I moved to southern
Arizona where we're enjoying an active and, so far, reasonably
healthy lifestyle! I continue to enjoy reading of the 'comings
and goings' at Blundell's and wish the School and students
well in all of their endeavors!
