They were even set the unenviable task of helping a Nepalese farmer to move his crop of tomatoes down the steep mountain sides without them being squashed! It was wonderful to see the children working together with such purpose, creativity and genuine passion to solve the problems and make a difference.

This term, we have seen our Eco-Committee looking to have a positive impact within our school community. They have been ever vigilant and challenged us all to be energy aware, with the promise of an Eco Award for the best class. They were also delighted to hear the news that solar panels will be fitted to the roof of our Pre-Prep, with work starting over the Christmas break. This array will provide enough energy to feed the Pre-Prep and the Prep, helping us with our ongoing move towards sustainability at Blundell's.

We all recognise that there will be significant environmental challenges ahead, and our children will be tasked with finding solutions. I am confident that our young Blundellians are well set to embrace those challenges head on.
