We always have a termly theme, which runs through our assemblies and features in lessons. For this Summer Term, we chose 'Challenge' and as you look through the pages of this edition of The Review, you will see countless examples of that theme in action. For many of our children, this term will have seen a challenge overcome. I can imagine that the residential trips may have been an occasion when fears

were faced and nerves tested, be that climbing the high ropes, leaping off rocks or simply being away from home for the first time. For others, it may have been something far less obvious but no less significant.

When facing a challenge, I encourage the children to follow three rules. Firstly, ignore the 'troll of self-doubt' who will try to put you off even trying. Secondly, you are going to need to 'put on your armour' as there may be external factors that make you question if you can do it. Finally, you are going to need to keep going, even if you don't make it the first time, as success often comes after a number of failures. Simple advice that is easy to give but often difficult to follow, and that is where the school environment and the people within it become the critical factor. We know how important it is for children to be challenged and to want to challenge themselves, but in order to do that safely and effectively, the conditions need to be just right. As you will see in the pages that follow, we have looked to create those conditions in a wide variety of fields, be that in the classroom, in music, drama or sport. To pack so much into the short term has been a particular challenge for the team here but it is one that we relish as the spectacular results make it all worthwhile.

My thanks to Mrs Lewis for her editorial efforts and to all of the Blundell's Prep team for their many contributions to this Summer 2023 Review.

## Speech Day


