



Harry has had a successful year in national academic competitions. He scored 100% in the Senior Maths Challenge in November and qualified for Round 1 of the Maths Olympiad. He placed in the top 100 in this and then moved on to Round 2, where he came in the top 20 in the UK.

In January, Harry achieved a Gold Award in Round 1 of the Chemistry Olympiad and his high score qualified him for the training camp in Cambridge for the selection of the pupils who would represent the UK in the International Chemistry Olympiad. He did so well in the final exam he was selected as a reserve. (There are 4 in the team and 2 reserves).

In November he achieved a Gold in Round 1 of the Physics Olympiad, which put him in the top 50 pupils nationwide. He was then invited to take part in Round 2 and also the British Astronomy and Astrophysics Olympiad. Harry achieved a Gold Award for each and his Astronomy Paper score qualified him for the final training camp in Oxford. After a tough camp he was selected for the team of 4 pupils to represent the UK in the International Astronomy and Astrophysics Olympiad in Colombia in September.

If that's not enough, in February Harry was placed second in the Bebras computational thinking National Final at Oxford University.

Since he is in Year 12 he will get another chance to do it all again next year.

They spoke about the use of a particular painting (pictured here!) as the source of inspiration for a filmmaker she is writing a book on. The relationship between cinema and painting is hugely significant and key to Dr Q-B's teaching at Blundell's (just ask her students if you want to know more!)

The Year 13 Film Students were delighted to visit the Bill Douglas Cinema Museum (Exeter University), one of the largest collections of material relating to the moving image in Britain. Dr Quinlivan-Brewer organised a special tour with the curator of the museum, Phil Wickham, giving students the opportunity to learn about some of the 75,000 rare objects on display including silk shoes belonging to Marlene Dietrich, film posters and ephemera, a velociraptor from Jurassic Park and original art work from Walt Disney's Cinderella. Students especially enjoyed exploring the collection of beautiful magic lanterns, stereoscopic images and a mutoscope, a Victorian, hand operated moving image device. This trip both enriched the students' study of film history and furthered their knowledge of the social, cultural and scientific implications of this art form!

Blundell's 2025

We were delighted to launch our Blundell's 2025 vision to parents in February this year. It is a culmination of 18 months of hard work by staff across the Prep and Senior Schools and it sets out clearly our ambitions and intentions for the school over the next 5 years.

What was important to us in developing our vision is that it should capture what Blundell's already is whilst at the same time articulating where it wants to be in the future. The idea of Roots and Wings is already deeply embedded in the school's DNA and so we built the strategy around that concept. However, our key objective was that we presented a vision that was at once something that all stakeholders could grasp and be excited about whilst simultaneously helping us to articulate a coherent educational philosophy that would help to shape our decision making into the future. We believe that we have achieved that tension very well.



Fundamentally it is our ambition to be the first choice of school in the South West for parents who are looking for a co-educational day and boarding school. We often say that if parents are relocating to the South West and they ask anyone about schools that Blundell's is the obvious choice.

That is a perfectly clear ambition but in truth that does not say very much about what makes Blundell's that clear first choice in a market filled with excellent schools who profess to do largely the same things. When we explored what it was that we wanted to be known for; what we wanted to be industry leaders in, then we settled on this:

"A school community that is more thoughtful in understanding its pupils, and innovative in developing their potential, than any other in Britain."


We are not that now but it is our earnest intent to have a claim on that in 2025.

SPRING CONCERT 2020

February 12th - Exeter Cathedral

Our annual Spring Concert was a spectacular event this year as we performed in Exeter Cathedral in a partnership event with 10 other invited schools, including our local state secondary school and Tiverton primary schools. The centrepiece of the concert was Alec Roth's beautiful, exciting and energetic A Time to Dance cantata, with the composer in attendance. With 250 musicians on stage it was musically ambitious and challenging but immensely rewarding for the students. The concert also featured an instrumental first half with various shorter ballet excerpts including those by Prokofiev and Tchaikovsky. The senior school orchestra also led the primary guests through the lilting and exciting Danzon by Marquez, the piece featuring many of our extremely talented instrumentalists in reflective solo sections before exploding into a feast of massed colour. A huge congratulations to everyone involved on what was an inspirational and wonderful evening of music making of the highest calibre. Kayaking

The paddlers campaign for Devizes to Westminster (DW) starts in September, with crews learning efficient forward paddling technique and being introduced to racing. When we go to Tarifa, Spain for December's winter training camp they progress onto the ocean, learning how to use waves, wind and tides to save energy, paddle efficiently and to enjoy the open water. They enjoy making their own risk assessments and choosing their own routes – resulting in an epic 18 mile downwind into the Straits of Gibraltar on the final day – a fabulous dose of Vitamin Sea care of the Zen Master Boyan, and the Surfski Centre Tarifa. The resulting video premiered in Latin Prayer and most PSHE lessons thereafter!

For the 3 crews that began the term heading for DW these skills proved to be vital when competing in the even-more-challenging-than-normal "warm-up" races, namely the Waterside and Thameside Series.

With three of the five warm up races cancelled due to Storm Dennis, floods and then the Coronavirus, getting to the start line in Devizes was increasingly unlikely.

Waterside C was therefore the last test they took on, and our crews proved their mettle. 23 miles, 35 portages, a 400m pitch black tunnel, and the infamous mile long run at Croftons Beam Engine.

Duncan was responsible for recruiting this Yr. 12 team and he did it in a K1 (Kayak for one person). He came 5th in the junior men's race – a superb achievement not to be under-estimated. Honor and Max have utterly proven themselves as a top class crew, winning the junior mixed race. Honor and Max are the team's secret weapon. Toby and Isaac have followed in Dougal and Francis' paddle-strokes, and it is a huge shame that they were not able to prove to themselves what they could have achieved in DW.

With a professional and hugely supportive team of parents, highly trained and prepared for, DW 2020 will be, for many, the year that wasn't to be. But we are looking forward to getting out to the beach, to the surfski racing season and some restorative Vitamin Sea.

We do need to say a huge vote of thanks to our unsung Captains, Tilda and Jess. Quietly but steadfastly herding the team, on runs, in Circuits, in the Shed and riverside car parks, and setting the pace on the river. Jess and Tilda are natural leaders, and typical paddlers – strong, resourceful, independent, caring and funny. We will miss them and there is always a boat in the shed for when they are next passing and fancy a quick paddle to the White Bridge.

With the perfect storm of torrential weather, fields being closed, new routes, and fallen trees blocking Heartbreak, the 140th running of the Russell was always going to be fun. It proved to be an excellent day with a high-level of competition between the top runners in all the houses. We had well over 500 runners out in the mud on Saturday, and each race created its own story. As everyone who ran around the course can attest to – it was brutal conditions. This was the culmination of three Russell races across the term, and the fact that almost every pupil has contributed shows a lot for what being a Blundellian is.

The School House had a taste of what's to come with a slightly different course, but still involving the knee-deep mud, with great performances all round. The Junior boys competition this year was dominated by a very strong Old House team, led by Ben, however, the Petergate boys came very close to beating them on Saturday. With the Russell it is not just about those in the top 10, you need depth throughout to be overall winners, and Gorton House certainly proved this in 2020, being led brilliantly by Beth in Year 10. They made sure their mid-table runners had strong performances ensuring the win overall. The Senior girl's competition was close, and with The Hockey girls missing in action in the first two races, this certainly had an effect overall. Megan is now one of the few girls to be able to say they have won the Junior and Senior races – a phenomenal accomplishment. Gorton House again showed excellent team depth, but North Close came within one place of taking the Junior cup this year. The Senior boys again came down to strength in depth, and Petergate proved that they are, again, the best Senior boys house. A phenomenal run from Harry has seen him rocket from being 41st in Year 9, to now winning the Russell in 2020. With Old House and Gorton House winning the cumulative points cups again, the challenge is now laid down for next year for the other houses to pry the cups away from this stronghold.

Celebrating 140 years

To help celebrate the 140th Russell
Run at Blundell's School we hosted a
Pasta Party the night prior to the race. Over
50 Old Blundellians, parents and pupils attended
the event. The Head, Bart Wielenga welcomed
our guests and he gave a terrific overview of how the
Russell has become a much-loved event at the hearts of
our Blundellians (but also equally detested by some as well!)

An archive display of Russell Run memorabilia including the Russell Run Trophy and list of winners was also on display at the event. The group dined on a two-course pasta dinner including seafood linguini, beef and pork cannelloni & wild mushroom tortellini, followed by a cheese and tiramisu course.

Over 75 Old Blundellians, parents and prep school pupils showed up the following day to take part in either the Open (9.1km or 5.6 miles) or Fun Run (3.4km or 2 miles) which was our biggest turn out yet! The course was terribly muddy and unfortunately, on the day, some of the course needed to be re-jigged in order to avoid some of the seriously muddy land.

Although the race is 143 years old, we celebrated the 140th Run as the race was cancelled three times since its start in 1877. In 1891, the run was cancelled due to a blizzard, in 1917 on the advice of the medical officer and again in 1932 due to an outbreak of scarlet fever.

The Westlakians who can now smile in the knowledge that they never have to run the Russell fields again, can hopefully look back on the experience knowing that they were involved in a part of Blundell's history.

Investec Girls' Schools Championships

This term saw the continuation of Girls' Hockey, as the Under 18 team played the later stages of the England Hockey Investec Plate competition.

January saw numerous lunchtime sessions as the girls managed to juggle mock examinations, netball and hockey. We played King's High from Warwick – an all-girls school with numbers far higher than ours. In an exciting game for the watching crowd, we came from behind to win 4-3 and progress to the quarter finals. Another home tie saw us play Dauntsey's School, again in front of a noisy crowd. After conceding early, we once again got ourselves back in the game, going onto secure a 3-1 win. That results saw us return to Lee Valley for the first time since 2017; for the majority it was a first trip to the Olympic Park.

The girls played Kent College in the semi-final. We took control of the game early on, with goals from Alice and Katie. After half time, Kent College came back into the game, scoring a penalty stroke to make it 2-1 before Kitty scored to make it 3-1. Kent then scored to make it 3-2, before scoring a stunning breakaway goal through their England U18 forward to make it 3-3. However, with the final action of the game, Alice converted her second to give us the win with just 15s left on the clock.

The final against Haileybury was played in sleet and snow, with conditions making playing incredibly tough. Haileybury took the lead from a corner early on, before Alice equalised from our own corner. Haileybury then converted another corner to take it to 2-1 at half time. After half time, Haileybury scored an excellent turnover goal to go 3-1. We responded quickly, with Betty scoring a great reverse stick strike to make it 3-2. Haileybury scored a 4th soon after from a lucky deflection that the goal scorer knew nothing about. Alice scored again to make it 4-3. Despite the girls' best efforts and missing the post by fractions and having a corner on time, we just couldn't find the equaliser.

Second place was an amazing achievement and the final was the first time they had lost since September 17th. There were England players on show throughout the Tier 2 and 3 finalists, reflecting the standard of this competition.

The girls were great ambassadors throughout. I would like to thank the girls for their efforts, Mr Mead for his amazing organisational work, Mr Jones for the extra coaching support and all the pupils and staff at school for their support.



The Blundell's Equestrian team have competed at NSEA events throughout the Spring Term. The U14's final was a hard fought and tense affair, with Uffculme putting up some really tough and uncompromising opposition. It would have been easy for heads to drop when the side went a score


down early on, which was very much against the run of play. But the whole squad responded brilliantly and played their way back into the game and eventually gained a dominant lead that they managed to hold onto.





Euan Friend (FH 2011-16) started for Oxford in the Varsity Match against Cambridge at Twickenham this year. He is the 18th Old Blundellian to play in the Varsity Match and the 11th Old Blundellian to don the Dark Blue of Oxford. Euan was the 'Loose Head Prop' for the team.

His selection in the front row came as a bit of a shock, given he played, with his twin brother Arthur Friend (OH 2011-16), in the back division for the Independent Schools Invitation side, the Lambs, on their South American tour in 2016. He played in the back row in his first two years at Oxford and asked head coach James Wade if he could convert to prop in the summer.

The Oxford coach, James Wade said; "Euan came to us as a wing forward and is a very talented player. He's normally a very quiet lad, but he came up to me in the gym in the summer and asked if he could convert to prop. That never happens normally. I told him that wouldn't be a problem and so I gave him a baptism by fire in Japan."

Wade added; "When I saw the size of him, I just started laughing. But Euan got his head down, learned from the experience and has just got better and better. He wanted to get a Blue, was prepared to do almost anything for it and has earned his chance – that epitomises what the Oxford players are prepared to do." While at Oxford, Euan is studying Earth Sciences at University College, and has bulked up to 14st 6lbs ready for the challenges as Prop.

The news of his selection for Oxford came a few days after Barrie Karea (OH 2016-18), now studying at Cardiff Met University, and Sam Maunder (FH 2002-18), who is at Exeter University, were both named in the 32-man elite training squad for England U20 for the 2020 U20 Six Nations championship. Sam was later named captain for the squad.

Euan, Barrie and Sam have all made a mark in the rugby world, proving Blundell's continues to produce rugby players of the highest calibre.



Former pupil turns Beekeeper in Tiverton

I never expected I would become a beekeeper but after watching a piece on Gardeners World, I wanted to find out more. I spoke to a family friend who is a local beekeeper and he let me help out with his hives for about a year. At the end of 2017, to my delight, he gave me my first colony and I've been busy with bees ever since!

After the long-wet winter, life has returned to the hive and the bees can be seen at the hive entrance, venturing out to collect early season pollen. Inside the hive, hopefully the queen will have started laying and bee numbers should be increasing. To ensure the new mouths have enough food, sugar paste has been provided. As soon as temperatures increase, with any luck towards the end of the month (to over 15 degrees), it will be possible to look inside the hive and do an inspection. This is an important time to check the queen is laying, to observe the general health of the colony, and to make plans for the season ahead.

Outside the hive, preparations are in hand for the honey season, it's a very busy time. The 'Supers' which are additional hive layers containing 12 waxed frames where the honey will be stored, need to be made ready. These will be required as the hives expand through the spring and summer, when the honey is being produced and bee numbers swell to around 40,000.

Beekeepers are always optimistic at this time of year, and despite the gloomy winter, I have high hopes for an abundance of honey this season. The honey will be ready in late August and the Blundell's Community is welcome to buy direct when ready. You can contact the Development Office or Mrs Berry in the Music Department for details.
