Academic



British Astronomy and Astrophysics Olympiads

Back in September Harry participated in the BAAO (British Astronomy and Astrophysics) Challenge Olympiad where he achieved a Distinction and an invite into the BAAO Olympiad. A little later in the term Harry also achieved a TOP Gold in Round 1 of the BPhO (British Physics Olympiad) which qualified him for Round 2. At the end of February/beginning

of March, just before returning to school, Harry sat 2 three hour papers and we have now received the results for both. Harry has achieved GOLD in both competitions, (individual scores are not given out so we won't know officially how well he did).

At the end of our Spring Term, Harry sat a 4 hour Chemistry exam and has since been selected for a team of 4 to represent the UK at the International Chemistry Olympiad in July. A fantastic achievement.

He will now be invited to attend the Oxford Training Camps, from the 6th to 10th April 2021, for the International Physics Olympiad and/or the International Olympiad Astronomy and Astrophysics. In Year 12 Harry was selected for the BAAO team. It is an outstanding achievement to be selected two years in a row, and a first for any Blundellian. Harry has put a tremendous amount of work into the preparation for these competitions over the past two years and dedicated a massive amount of time during the holidays to this, completing endless past papers and thoroughly deserves his place on the training camps and a place on the international teams.

Just before the return to school we also entered students into the Senior and Intermediate Physics Challenges run by the British Physics Olympiad (BPhO). For the first time this year due to Covid 19 the challenges were run online. Each challenge consisted of two 30 minute papers testing Physics knowledge in a variety of ways.

The Senior Challenge is aimed at Year 12 pupils and the Intermediate Challenge is aimed at Year 11 students. Each challenge covers questions of an appropriate level based on an assortment from Dynamics, Electricity, Optics, Heat, Units, small amounts of Astronomy and Waves to name just a few.

This Year 8 students including two Year 11s entered the Senior Challenge. In total there were 5,270 entries from approximately 380 schools and students were awarded certificates if they achieved Bronze or higher. I am delighted to announce that all of our participants this year achieved an award - 4 Silvers and 4 Bronzes.

Well done to everyone who entered these National Competitions, amazing effort from all especially the Year 10 who have only just started their GCSE course.




Sixth Form Debate (Wellington vs Blundell's)



Virtual Scholarships

As with so many things that needed improvisation this year, we were unable to run our 11+ and 13+ scholarship days on site so we moved them online.

Applicants were posted their exam papers in sealed envelopes and invited in small groups to Teams meetings where an invigilator oversaw the opening of the papers and the sitting of exams to ensure the process was as rigorous as always.

Completed papers were then photographed, converted to PDFs and emailed to the school for marking. The pupils involved showed great independence and impressive technical skills to cope admirably with this extra level of complication, whilst still performing at such a high level in the examinations, in such novel circumstances.

Artistic skills were also assessed online via Teams meetings and recordings of Musical performances were submitted for assessment

We were delighted with the impressive levels of ability shown by all the applicants this year, which made for some very tough decisions for Mr Wielenga to make over the awarding of Scholarships.

Getting motivated — Start with why, have a routine
Tricks to beat procrastination — "Why" brainstorm, "just 5 minutes" trick.
Staying energised — (Right) food, water evercise, sleep


Some comments from the pupils following the workshop were:

Exploring Options

We have joined in the celebrations of two National careers events this term, supporting students across the year groups to explore options and opportunities for their future, which they may not have thought about before.

National Apprenticeship Week took place in February, with daily events hosted by UCAS and employers such as IBM and EY, enabling students to find out more about what apprenticeships involve and the growing range of opportunities available. We launched the week with our Blundell's Degree Apprenticeship event and welcomed the return of OB Emily Squibb (2014 – 2019 NC), Formulation & Process Design Degree Apprentice at Pfizer, to share her experiences and decision to follow a degree apprenticeship route. We also welcomed Pearson College London and the University of Exeter, to learn more about the many Degree Apprenticeship programmes available, including Chartered Manager, Digital Technology Solutions, Diagnostic Radiographer, Applied Finance and Civil Engineering.

In March, we celebrated National Careers Week and shared a daily quick watch, explore and careers spotlight, via the Careers Zone on the Engagement & Enrichment site, to inspire and engage students in learning more about the many careers and directions available to them. Events included a virtual careers fair, university and STEM festivals and talks and lectures, including those hosted by Blundell's which over 100 students and teachers participated in over the course of the week. We are very grateful to all of the speakers, who gave their time to share their expertise with us: Andrew Wallis, from Falmouth University who talked about 'Creative Careers and Degree Courses'; Paul Richards, an Advanced Physiotherapy Practitioner in the NHS; Madeleine Shaw (also singing teacher at Blundell's) who talked about 'The Job of an Opera Singer'; Professor Nigel Holt, Head of Psychology at Aberystwyth University; and Jessica Coggins, Research Associate, UWE Bristol who talked about her pathway into sports and health research.

Year 7 Castles Project

Year 7 Castles Projects: During Lockdown Year 7 have been studying the development of castles all the way from the Motte and Bailey Castles of the Normans after 1066 right up to the modern era and how castles are used today. They looked at different designs of castles and how technology and tactics helped to change the design and building materials of them and they also looked at the weapons that were used to lay siege to castles through the middle ages. As part of the project they were tasked with building a model of a castle at home-some opted for the traditional cardboard and cellotape, while others went a little more contemporary and designed and built a castle on

Minecraft, a creative computer game. Across the board they seemed to enjoy the project and with such a wealth of castles in the local vicinity, they have plenty of options to visit when the lockdown lifts!





Modern Languages

During lockdown, our language learners have been busy cooking some delicious French/Spanish dishes. It gave us a fantastic opportunity to offer a different learning experience to our students to learn languages. It enabled us to present language learning in context rather than the sometimes more artificial environment of the classroom. Year 7 produced some savoury tapas 'tomate y jamón tostadas'. Others preferred to make a traditional Spanish omelette 'tortilla de patatas'. The 'churros y chocolate caliente' were also very popular.

Year 8 were given the task to prepare a 3-course meal with regional dishes from France: quiche Lorraine, coq au vin, salade niçoise, mousse au chocolat, brioche and even crème brulée et caramel. Pictures of these wonderful creations are on display in the MFL building.

Each week of the lockdown learning our Year 12 French students were give a new recipe to complete. The first task was to bake a Galette des rois. The galette des rois, celebrating Epiphany, the day the Three Kings (les rois) visited the infant Jesus, is baked throughout January in France. It is a very popular tradition in France where families get together to share the cake on 6th January. Whoever finds the little ceramic charm in their slice of the cake gets to be king or queen for the day.

To celebrate "la chandeleur" (French pancake day) on 2nd February we enjoyed la galette des rois, la brioche, le pain au chocolat, les macarons and crepes. Again, making the most of the online teaching by including things that we are not able to do in class. There is more to learning languages than just grammar and vocabulary!



At the start of lockdown we set the 5K Challenge for our pupils, a student from each year group was initially nominated to complete their 5K.



Working in the drilling industry has been a roller-coaster ride but I have been fortunate enough to survive the worst down-turns and the experience has been incredible. I haven't really lived in the UK since 1978, although I owned a flat in London until 1983, but have lived in Sharjah, Greece, Qatar, Denmark, Germany and Norway. I've worked on almost 70 different drilling rigs on land and sea in 11 different countries – ranging from the 50 ° c temperatures amongst the high sand dunes of the empty quarter of Saudi Arabia to snow and hurricane winds north of the Arctic circle offshore Norway. Finally taking early retirement after the latest downturn in drilling activity in 2015/16. Living abroad has meant I've only visited Blundell's once, about 20 years ago, together with my wife and children. The kids are Danish and teenagers at the time so were flabbergasted at the requirements for uniforms, ties, jackets, calf-length skirts, and not least discipline! It was a good visit, and I was fortunate to meet Ted Crowe again while being shown around the chapel. Other than that, I attended a couple of OB events while living in Germany which

was slightly surreal as I was already older than the parents of the other OBs; the Head pumped me for my thoughts on life at Blundell's during the late sixties and it was great to catch up with the late Paddy Armstrong, who as coach for the 3rd XV and the summer Athletics team had been a major influence during my time at Blundell's. I have now retired in a market town in Jutland, Denmark, and this is it, no more moves!"

Ross Hill-Brown (W 1969-74)

"After leaving Blundell's in 1974 I served in the Royal

Hong Kong Police Force as Chief Inspector. I finished the day before the handover to the People's Republic of China (PRC). That same year my wife (Joy) and I migrated to Australia and have settled in Adelaide, South Australia. During this service, I received two Commanding Officer's Commendations that acknowledged

my professional ability, energy and devotion to duty of a very high order. In 1992, the year I got married, I received the Colonial Police Long Service Medal for long service and good conduct and in 2001 we welcomed a son into the world.

In 1999, I joined the South Australia Police as a Criminal Intelligence Analyst (an unsworn position). During my service, I worked as a Senior Analyst focusing on organised crime and money laundering.

I played a little low level rugby and then took up Archery holding the position of President of the Police Archery Club for ten years, which included being on the Hong Kong Archery Committee and a qualified national archery judge.

Since coming to Australia, I have focused on track and field athletics and have had some reasonable results winning State and National sprint medals for my age group. At the 2007 World Police Fire Games, held in Adelaide, I was part of the 4 x 400 Grand Master relay team which won Bronze.

In August 2015, having attended the World Track and Field Masters in France, while in England, I was involved in a head on collision that left me an incomplete tetraplegic, requiring rods in my spine. I was expected to never walk again. My rehab started in Southampton Hospital and finished in South Australia and I am pleased to say I did walk again! In fact, I have since won National medals for race walking in my age group. I have been designated a T36 para athlete which has seen me receiving State Medals for 100m, 200m and 400m in the over 50 category. Also SA Masters Athletics awarded me Best Athlete of the year 2017 and Flinders Athletics, where I am Vice-President, the Jacob Murray Medal 2017/2018 in part for my contribution towards working on a table to be used so that disabled athletes can compete against their able

bodied counterparts on a level playing field.

Point

When not taking part in my other "religion" I am an active member of our local Anglican church and Vice-President of our local Interchurch council.

2020 saw the publication of THE EIGHTEEN POINT FIVE, a book in which I have contributed a co-authored chapter outlining my journey after my injury. The book as a whole shares the challenges, experiences and insights of people living with disabilities and disorders. Full details can be found at https://eighteenpointfive.com.au/."

After finishing as Head of Economics from 1984 to 1996, Johnathan went to teach at Cardiff Metropolitan University. He went on to fundraise, mainly for mental health charities and raised upwards of £250K for these causes. He was made an 'Hon Welsh American' for his work with the North America Wales Foundation. NWAF concentrated on sending young people to the United States to study subjects like art and music.

Jonathan has written five books and is now on his sixth book; 'Famous Politicians of Wales' which will be launched in the House of Commons. He currently lives in Brecon, Wales between the Castle Hotel and Brecon Cathedral and is always open to visitors.

Four Brothers Crossing the Atlantic Together





The Journey of the Blundell's Colours Jacket

You may recall in a recent Popham Post that a Colours jacket was spotted for sale (£150!) in a stall in London by Lawrence Clarke (P 2017-19). Janet Wooff kindly took up the challenge of tracking down the owner from the nametag inside and with the help of Lawrence, the jacket was reunited with its rightful owner, Derek Miles (SH 1949-52).

Derek was awarded his 'Full Colours' for shooting in the summer of 1952 as a member of the team who were awarded the Grand Aggregate Trophy at Bisley. The whole school turned out to welcome the team back and the Headmaster awarded a half day holiday in recognition!

The jacket was understood to be second-hand when purchased from the School Shop and although the original owner is unknown the quality of the material suggests it might have been made before the second world war.

After leaving school Derek wore the jacket to various shooting events and even took it to West Africa on his first tour of duty in 1956-58. It is not known how the jacket made its way to the Vintage shop; however, Derek is delighted to be reunited with it.

Blundell's Unique Uniforms

The Journey of the Blundell's Jacket promoted some of our OBs to show off some of the more unique uniform choices throughout the years.

Obituary

Sir Peter Harper (W 1952-57)

"Peter Harper, who has died aged 81, was a world expert on the genetics of inherited neurological disorders, particularly Huntington's disease and muscular dystrophy. He also advocated the idea of genetic counselling – helping people to understand the implications of inherited disorders that might affect them and their families.



Finding a genetic link between the two wasting conditions has led to highly accurate diagnostic and predictive tests for at-risk individuals and their families. While there is still no remedy, his work has contributed to an understanding of the underlying molecular mechanisms, providing hope that a cure will one day be available.

Peter was born in Barnstaple, Devon, and had what he described as an 'idyllic semi-rural upbringing.' He attended Blundell's School from 1952-57, then Exeter College and Oxford, where he studied medicine.

He became drawn to genetics at Oxford, and, after clinical studies at St Thomas' hospital in London, qualified in medicine in 1964, determined to embark on a career combining clinical medicine and genetics.

In 1969 they went to Baltimore in the US, where Peter undertook a two-year research fellowship where he developed a special interest in neurogenetics and carried out a study of myotonic dystrophy, in which half the offspring of a sufferer become affected. This established linkage of the condition to blood group markers called Lu and ABH. The markers and the disorder tended to be co-inherited within families, indicating that they are likely to be close together on the same chromosome, an important first step towards identifying the causative gene.

In late 1971 Peter became a lecturer at the University of Wales College of Medicine (now part of Cardiff University), and eventually established his own medical genetics department as a professor. As well as establishing genetic linkages with neurological conditions, in conjunction with other researchers in the US and mainland Europe he developed a clinical genetics service offering diagnosis and counselling that grew to cover the whole of Wales, and was housed in a new, purpose-built institute in 1985.

Peter's approach built on the work of Sheldon Reed and others in the US, but placed new emphasis on the involvement of non-medically trained counsellors. In his book Practical Genetic Counselling (1981) he described an approach to advising patients and relatives that helps them to come to their own conclusions about possible future courses of action, rather than be directed by clinicians. He originally intended the book for GPs and non-specialists, but to his surprise it became a standard text for genetic counsellors worldwide, and is now in its eighth edition in many languages.

Peter's work also became important in attracting other researchers to Cardiff and he was pivotal in establishing a world reputation for Cardiff University not only in medical genetics but also in psychiatric genetics.

He retired formally in 2004, the year he was knighted, but continued to work as an emeritus research professor at Cardiff, writing mostly on the history of medical genetics and on ethics. He also maintained an interest in the Genetics and Medicine Historical Network, which he had set up in 2002 in order to make sure that the early history of medical genetics was not lost as its founders retired or died. The last of his six books, Evolution of Medical Genetics – A British Perspective, was published in 2020.

He is survived by Elaine, and their children and seven grandchildren.

School Reports


Having asked our Old Blundellians to share with us some of there report cards from the past, there was certainly one that stood out: John Batten (SH 1953-58)!

Report cards do not necessarily indicate future success and for John, that was certainly the case. John Batten left Blundell's in 1958 and worked in investment banking in London, working his way up to Vice-President and later Director. He also worked as Company Secretary for a small merchant bank for a decade and did four years as MD of a small offshore bank. In his late 40's John 'decided he'd had enough of this largely formulaic activity' and became a professional photographer.

Latin: "Rather a poor and ineffective term's work. After a fairly good start he lapsed into his causal ways."


General Science: "He does not show enough determination to succeed."
