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Quite often, the journey from Christmas to Easter can be quite a grim, dark period at school. 
Under the leadership of Dr Leaman and Mr Johnson our musicians worked incredibly hard to prepare for that, but every second was a joy and the two hours flew by. It was tremendous to include musicians from the Prep School, and also from Tiverton High School, St Peter's Prep School and Exeter Cathedral School.

On the sporting front we enjoyed remarkable success in both the boys' hockey and the girls' netball. Often the Spring Term sports play second fiddle to the Autumn Term sports, but boys' hockey has achieved unprecedented success including 1st XI wins against teams we don't often beat, including Sherborne and King's Taunton. It has been good to see the senior boys' success filter down and the U14's had a very good run in the West of England competition, narrowly missing out on a top 4 place on goal difference. Similarly, netball is enjoying a wonderful resurgence and an experienced 1st VII were one of the strongest teams on the circuit. The U14 and U15 teams also enjoyed great success and it certainly bodes well for the coming years.

We take great pride in our team sports, and not just at the elite end of the spectrum. The opportunity to represent the school in a team sport is fundamental to being a Blundellian and it is great to see that we can put out a 5th team in the senior girls' netball and a 3rd XI, and sometimes even a 4th XI, in hockey alongside four U18 football teams. On any given Saturday that means that just in the U18 category, close to 150 pupils are turning out in our colours on a Saturday – and that is before you include the U12's to U15's.

Of course, beyond that, pupils can test themselves in other ways too and this term there are two major events for which pupils are preparing. Both Ten Tors and the Devizes to Westminster International Marathon have been covid-affected but we expect a strong Blundell's representation at both. These epic challenges fit right into the ethos of the school and is echoed in our mantra that just because something is tough, it doesn't mean we shouldn't do it!

Chemistry

The Chemistry Olympiad competition is the leading Chemistry competition for secondary pupils in the UK. Over 8500 of the best chemistry pupils in Years 12 and 13 took part in the competition this year, and Blundell's pupils have performed exceptionally well once more. The top 30% of pupils were awarded a silver, and the top 9% a gold. Blundell's achieved 7 silver awards and 2 golds. Gold Awards went to James and Rainer (both Year 12).

James not only achieved a gold award, but his score was high enough to place him in the top 34 pupils in Year 12 or 13 in the UK, and thus qualify for Round 2. This involves lessons and demonstrations on new topics from respected Cambridge academics, teachers and technicians, followed by a 4 hour theoretical test. Four of the these pupils will then be selected to represent the United Kingdom at the International Chemistry Olympiad 2022 in Tianjin, China. This is a formidable achievement for James, particularly since he is in Year 12, and we wish him all the best of luck. This is the third year in a row that Blundell's has had a representative in Round 2!



Physics

There have been 4 Physics Competitions this term, two online and two written papers.

BPhO Physics Challenge

The paper is designed to challenge the best young physicists in the country. The paper was sat in November by two Year 13 and three Year 12 pupils; tackling this challenge in Year 12 is particularly impressive. James (Year 12) achieved a silver award, this puts him in the top 30% of entries.

BPhO Physics Senior Challenge

The Senior Challenge saw our largest number of entries in years with 13 pupils attempting it. Out of 4000 entries from approximately 500 schools we have achieved fantastic results. 4 golds, 1 silver and 4 bronzes. Gold awards went to James, Oliver, Louis and Joshua. Special mention to James and Oliver whose fantastic scores place them both in the top 10 pupils in the UK in Year 12.





Maths

Senior Maths Challenge

from Years 9-13 sat the senior
Maths challenge on Thursday 18th
November. This is a high level of Maths,
generally aimed at challenging A-Level
Maths pupils. This year we were very successful with
7 gold, 6 silver and 16 bronze awards. Gold awards
went to James, Shirley, Jane, Harry, Rainer, Edward
and Louis. The top performing pupils were Edward
and James, who not only secured gold awards,
but also qualified for the British Maths Olympiad
Round 1, for the top 1000 pupils in the country.

British Maths Olympiad Round 1,

As a follow-on round to the Senior Maths Challenge, James and Edward both achieved Distinctions, putting them in the top 250 pupils in the country - a fantastic result. This is the first time we have ever had 2 pupils achieve at this level. Further to this, Edward's score was high enough to qualify him for for the British Maths Olympiad Round 2, putting him in the top 100 of all Maths pupils in the country (any age up to Year 13) - an achievement that we have only seen three times in recent memory at Blundell's, particularly remarkable given he is only in Year 9!

Intermediate Maths Challenge

66 pupils from Years 8-11 sat the Intermediate Maths Challenge in February. Over 50% of pupils achieved an award, with 5 Golds, 13 Silvers and 18 Bronzes.

The five gold awards were awarded to: Edward (best in school and 100%), Freya (best in year), Henry (Year 9), Hector (Year 11) and Angel (Year 11).



Other notable performances came from: Harry (Year 10) – best in year and a silver award and Terry (Year 8) – best in year and a bronze award.

In total, 10 pupils qualified for the follow-on Olympiad and Kangaroo rounds; another record!

Senior Online Challenge

In total there were 4690 entries from approximately 272 schools. All of our participants this year achieved an award – 3 golds, 7 silvers and 4 bronzes. Gold Award winners were James, Josh and Oliver.



IOC Intermediate Online Challenge (aimed at Yr 11 pupils).

Six Year 11 pupils took the part in the Intermediate Online Challenge. 156 schools participated, with 4,494 participating pupils. Rafael and Freya obtained gold (top 19% of entries).



Belinda Kirk Event

We were fortunate enough to have adventurer and explorer, Belinda Kirk come into school last Friday. She delivered a hugely inspirational speech to our 6th form as part of their Enrichment program. Belinda has spent 26 years leading groups into the wilderness all over the world. These include numerous personal expeditions, youth development expeditions, biological research missions and remote filming trips for the BBC. She is a

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Guinness World Record holder for rowing unsupported around Britain and this latter adventure is what she concentrated on when talking to our 6th formers. The message she delivered to them was centred around the huge benefits they could gather from adventuring, getting out of their comfort zone and that the transformational power of adventure cannot be underestimated.

Belinda then presented to parents at a supper and talk event where she spoke of the importance of family adventuring; again, getting out of our comfort zones and benefitting from the mental wellbeing adventure can bring us all.

If, like me, you read Joan Aitken's classic novel as a child, you will no doubt have been gripped by the mystery, the dreadful dangers and the daring escapes of two plucky young cousins who take on their wicked governess. With pantomime-esque villains and set in a time that never was when wolves roamed England, the story feels a bit like a Grimm fairytale or a Dickens novel, but it was the two heroines Bonnie and Sylvia

Some decades later, I discovered that Russ Tunney had adapted this story for the stage and when I read it, I found it brought to life once again and I loved the way that Tunney had picked up on Aitken's fast-paced action and the tongue-in-cheek humour. When choosing a play for our post-Covid-comeback, a play full of fun and adventure that showed young people being brave and resilient in the face of unexpected danger felt like a perfect choice.

Tunney's adaptation is very inventive, taking us on the same exciting adventure as the original novel, from Winter to Spring, from the countryside to the city and back again. A tale full of snow and wolves, of ships and trains, of secret passageways and geese, and along the way it never takes itself too seriously. We have tried to evoke the spirit of this thrilling adventure and capture some of the magic of the original book. In doing so, we have enlisted the help of so many people. As with any Blundell's production, this show has been a real team effort, from the support of the Marketing Department to the delicious interval treats from Catering, from the help of the Music teachers to the artistic talents of the Art Department and of course the colossal efforts of everyone in the Drama Department who so willingly give so much of their precious time to bring a play to the stage. 

I became involved in the Rotary and joined the Sasolburg club in 1982 as the President. I played league squash and played for several years until I was forced to stop because of Glaucoma affecting my eyesight.

In 2011, we subdivided our property, designed, and built our retirement home on the remainder and sold off the original house. I was a Director of a Civil Engineering company from 1998 until I retired in 2005 at 60. Since then, I have been employed as a consultant on a part-time basis.

I have been involved in hiking for a fair portion of my life and ran a hiking club for 20 years. During that time, I led numerous hike weekends away. Caryll also hikes with me, and we have recently hiked overseas in Albania, Greece, Italy, Chile and Iran. I am also a keen sailor and play golf whenever the opportunity arises.


John Van der Kiste (Westlake 1967-72)
