STEM week in the Prep school was also hive of activity. Throughout the school, each year group had a different engineering project, from cranes and judder robots, to making their own 3D rooms with working lighting and alarm circuits. Year 6 constructed their fuelled Rockets, having designed and thoroughly tested their prototypes in their Engineering lessons. With the help of Mr Morrison in the Senior School they were fitted with rocket fuel and raced across the tennis courts. The top speed reached by the winner was 35mph! The children also had an opportunity to work with Senior School Biologists to dissect a cow's eve and learn first-hand about the different parts of the eye and how it works.

A fun, informative and collaborative week was had by all!

During the Spring Term, children from across the Pre-Prep took part in our whole school STEM week. Every year group had the opportunity to get involved in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths activities in and outside of their classrooms with lots of opportunities for the children to work with pupils from other year groups.

Not put off by the wet weather, Nursery and Reception put on their waterproofs and headed off to the School Garden at the Senior School to join Mr Olive with some gardening activities before enjoying hot chocolate and a story in the Cabin. Projects continued outdoors when the children welcomed our head gardener, Mr Flower, to the school and with the

help from Eco club, the children all took part in rewilding areas of the school site with wildflower seed.

A collaborative spirit saw pupils from across the school all take part in an engineering challenge. Activities included making marble runs and natural mazes. All of the children showed great determination and demonstrated just how well they could all work together.

There was also a Chemistry experiment when Mr Mead (Head of Chemistry) and some year 12 students visited year 1 and they were able to make glue from milk which they then used to make paperchains, year 6 helped the pre-prep children with some fun

maths activities including playing board games and filling out graphs as well as the loose parts play zone in the playground where their imaginations ran wild, making things such as vehicles, shops and cafes from old pipes and plant pots! CAM & HGM

At the end of the week, we brought all the beautiful artwork together to make our very own dot inspired art exhibition. ELT




## NURSERY TRIP TO KNIGHTSHAYES
